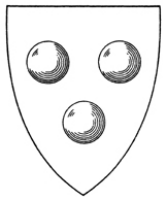

News from the Business Office

As many of you know, EdLine (our online grade books) has been operational all month. From the many appreciative comments, I can tell that many of you are using EdLine and finding it very useful. Let me encourage the rest of you to create an account and log on as soon as you can. Progress reports are updated at the end of every week (no later than Monday night) so that you can keep track of each grade. Incidentally, since updated progress reports are available online every week, we will no longer be sending hard copies home. We intend to begin posting homework assignments on EdLine in the near future in order to make it possible for every student to know exactly what is due each day, even when he or she has to miss school.

We are also looking forward to several December events. First, St. Nicholas of Myra (the original St. Nick) will be visiting the students on St. Nicholas's Day (Tuesday, 6 December).

Mr. and Mrs. Murray have been working on getting ready for the Christmas concerts. This year, we will be trying something a bit different. The regular Christmas concert will be held in St. Anthony Hall at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, 20 December. In an attempt to have enough seats for everyone, only 3rd grade and up will perform at the Christmas concert. Instead of singing at the concert, the Pre-K through 2nd grades will put on a Christmas Pageant at 1:30 p.m. on Thursday, 22 December in St. Anthony Hall.

Finally, I would like you to be aware that the academy will dismiss at noon on Friday, 23 December, and will close immediately after. There will be no after school care of any kind (any student left behind will be charged \$1 per minute for supervision). Please plan accordingly.

We've had a busy month in the parish business office. You may not know that the registrar of the school, Mrs. Kathleen Benzaquen, and the Bookkeeper of the school, Mrs. Phillips, are both paid employees of the church – even though the majority of their work is handling school business. This is a tremendous savings for the school budget; one more way in which our parish is integrated and works for a common goal.

Looking ahead, current student *Re-Registration for 2006-2007* begins on January 3rd online. You will want to re-register in a timely manner for two reasons. First, many of our classes are now at capacity. When *Open Enrollment* begins on February 13th, we will assign any openings at that time to new families. Second, the registration fee is going up on Feb. 13th for all those who register after that date and for all new families. For those who have students here, the registration fee will remain at \$500 per child for another year. For those who register after February 13th, the registration fee will be \$600. We will no longer charge separately for testing and application fees.

We are working on additional features for our online registration page, including an online credit card payment for the registration fee to save you a trip to the registrar's office to lock in your place. The continual growth of the academy means that we must continue to develop ways to remain efficient to serve our families with our limited staff.

Recently, our office conducted a survey of area Catholic schools to ascertain the range of tuition charged, and the discounts offered by each institution. We gathered this same information (from the same schools) in 1994 -- the year of our opening -- and again in 1998. By comparison, each time we analyzed the data, we found that The Atonement Academy was among the least expensive by way of tuition and registration fees, and also the most generous with family discounts. We were also the most generous in not penalizing families who are not registered and active members of the parish. This was also true for the recent data gathered, especially in the area of family discounts for high school students. We are the only school not charging an out-of-parish premium. The School Council will be reviewing this data in the coming weeks and making its recommendations to the pastor.

As Mr. Arndt mentioned in his article, The King's Fair was a huge success. A detailed report on expenses and income will be reported in the next issue of THE PELICAN.

FOURTH GRADE

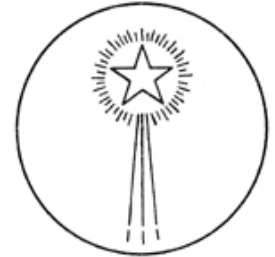

GEOGRAPHY

**MIDDLE & UPPER SCHOOL ENGLISH,
AND EIGHTH GRADE RELIGION**

I encourage you to check the EdLine calendar for upcoming assignment due dates. While the daily homework assignments for the middle school English classes are consistently the same—a grammar worksheet and literature reading—the due dates for papers and the dates of approaching tests are not so predictable. To assist you and your children in preparing for major assignments, I try to post significant assignments on EdLine. You should be able to click on the posting to view a summary of an assignment or explanation of what a test will cover.

The middle scholars of the sixth and seventh grades will be studying more complicated grammar structures, including participial and gerund phrases, independent and subordinate clauses, and appositives. The sixth graders will be reading *The Voyage of the Dawn Treader*, while the seventh graders will continue *The Lord of the Rings*. The eighth graders will be studying advanced writing techniques such as showing and telling, composing with concrete diction, and active and passive construction. They will also be delving into the Renaissance-mind of William Shakespeare.

The sophomores in British Literature have completed their study of two Shakespeare plays. We will be jumping back in time by reading the epic *Beowulf*. We will then return to the Renaissance by covering major poets of that age.

**MIDDLE & UPPER SCHOOL LATIN,
ADVANCED MATHEMATICS I,
AND SEVENTH GRADE RELIGION**

Felix adventus Christi! The sophomores continue their steady pace through advanced math and Euclidean geometry. In Latin I, as students continue to translate *Lingua Latina*, they will also be memorizing endings in a systematic way to help them order the plethora of endings lest they be overwhelmed. For those who struggle, please continue to read aloud early lessons.

In Latin III, we have begun our games, the “ludus Latinus,” which could be translated either “Latin school” or the “Latin game.” For Romans, school was a lot of fun. Whatever my



students say to the contrary notwithstanding, they seem to think that the Romans called school *ludus* as a clever enticement by which to lure unwitting children to toil and torture. In addition, we shall work on our translation skills which need improvement by a well-paced reading of *Familia Romana*. Finally, we hope to take turns representing to the class grammar which I shall have introduced earlier in the week; a kind of précis exercise.

**MIDDLE AND UPPER SCHOOL LATIN II,
LATIN III, RELIGION, ENGLISH**

During late November and December, Seventh Grade Religion will study the role that Moses and the Prophets played in Salvation History. Our overview of the Old Testament prophets will conclude with a discussion of John the Baptist. We will then discuss the Incarnation and Nativity of Our Lord. Latin II will learn the passive indicative in all conjugations and translate larger passages of continuous text. Latin III will finish its overview of grammar while translating selections from Cicero’s *Orations Against Catiline* and Caesar’s *Gallic Wars*. Students in both Latin classes continue studying the culture and architecture of ancient Rome. **Latin Students must review declensions, verb forms, and vocabulary daily.**

Freshman English will conclude its study of the *Odyssey* with an essay comparing this epic with the movie, *O Brother, Where art Thou?* The class then will read through the Middle English Arthurian Romance of *Gawain and the Green Knight*.

Freshman Theology will continue to read through the portions of the Old Testament that delineate Salvation History. By Christmas Break, the class will have read through the rise and fall of the Davidic dynasty.
